Research Facilities	The Center for Archaeology, Materials and Applied Spectroscopy (CAMAS) is a multidisciplinary research center offering pXRF, stable isotope (IRMS) analysis, scanning electron microscopy, and laser ablation ICP-MS and other materials analysis/testing. The Idaho Virtualization Laboratory creates 3D visualization and models and houses the Virtual Zooarchaeology of the Arctic. The Idaho Museum of Natural History is on the ISU campus and is the regional repository for the archaeology of Southeastern Idaho; students can request access to collections for study and research. The Department houses and manages the Visual Research Laboratory, Biomolecular Archaeology Laboratory, and Donald Crabtree Laboratory for lithic analysis. Departmental projects include the Northern Shoshone Language Program, Hispanic Health Projects, Aleutian Ethnographic Projects, Experimental Archaeology.
